ACS College, Maregaon, presently affiliated to the SGB Amravati University, Amravati (MS). The Arts graduation studies began in the college in 1989 and in 2009 Commerce & Science respectively. Executive Summary

The performance appraisal of the institution is summarized below:

1. Curricular Aspects

ACS College, Maregaon upholds the motto of "That is the Education, which is Emancipatory" ("Grahya Tamso Jyoti") in the realization of its vision of emancipation of the community through value-based holistic higher education. The college offers a plethora of courses – 3 UG programmes affiliated to SGB Amravati University, Amravati. The exposure of faculty in recent advances through participation in and organization of National conferences, seminars, workshops, Refresher and Orientation courses, and feedback from students, alumni and academic experts give the right impetus and direction for necessary changes in the curriculum. Faculty Development Programmes on ICT based teaching-learning provide further scope for dynamism in curricula designing and restructuring. Feedback on curriculum obtained from students, academic peers, parents and stakeholders have facilitated changes of the curriculum, innovative initiatives and ensured continuous growth. Members of our faculty, nominated by the affiliating University on its academic committees have made seminal contribution in making the curriculum industry-relevant by suggesting incorporation of components appropriate for the purpose.

The vision of the college is to offer general education and cultural improvement to produce students who will be equipped to practice justice, honors and charity in their various vocations of life. The goals and objectives are well articulated and they are duly disseminated to fresher through the college calendar, prospectus, website and induction meetings held at the beginning of each academic session. The college encourages the students to take active part in the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Coaching classes are arranged for MPSC, UPSC, JRF, Civil Services, PCS, Banking and Railways examinations, Remedial classes for SC/ST to orient the students towards career placements. Exposure to industrial organizations through industrial visits, invited talks by business experts, interface with successful entrepreneurs and exhibitions by young entrepreneurs are arranged. Above 100 eminent resource persons in various disciplines from across the nation have visited the institution.

2. Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The College has web camera in each classroom, laboratories and administrative office. The College annually publishes updated prospectus. It consists of detailed information about the college infrastructure facilities, admission procedure and documents necessary for the admission. The time-table prepared in advance. The college has developed its website which is regularly updated. Admission to the programmes is by a transparent, well-administered mechanism, complying with all the norms of the concerned regulatory and governing agencies including state and central governments. The institution ensures equity and wide access by following the policy of merit and is well represented by students from different geographical area and socio-economic, cultural and educational backgrounds.

The college plans and organize teaching, learning and evaluation schedules by strictly following the Directorate College Education and University Academic Calendar, by maintaining academic diaries of the academic events and co-curricular activities and preparing its annual blue print of the academic events and co-curricular activities.

The college facilitates free-ship, fee concessions, scholarships to the students from disadvantaged community and economically weaker sections. Term tests are conducted to assess the academic needs of the students and slow learners and advanced learners identified through an analysis of the formative tests. Remedial classes are arranged to help the slow learners to adapt to the rigorous teaching learning process and to make credible academic progress. Specialized classes are organized for enhancing the competence and performance of advanced learners. SC, ST, VJ, NT, SBC, OBC, minority and economically backward students are given remedial coaching during Improvement Period.

College conducting periodic class tutorials and home assignments, organizing group discussions, presentations, revision lectures, ICT based teaching learning and econtent developments are some of the best practices for the summative exams to be conducted by the university. The teachers evaluate the students by interacting with them and get the feedback. Along with the lecture method, the teachers follow the interactive method to encourage students to express themselves and to consolidate their understanding. The teachers also promote a computer based learning, experiential learning. The students and faculty have access to current issues, latest events through journals, magazines, periodicals, reports, newspapers, and internet. The students are encouraged and guided by the teachers for optimal use of the library. The feedback from outgoing students regarding evaluation of the teachers is taken regularly. After analysis of such feedback, evaluation of the teachers is carried out. On the basis of this analysis Principal guides and encourages concerned teacher for improvement. The faculty members are appointed by following regulations of University and State Government. The management encourages the faculty members for their professional development by granting study leave, deputing them to conferences, seminars and other training programmes such as refresher courses and orientation programmes. Thus, the college tries for excellence through such quality sustenance and enhancement measures. Student mentoring and guidance services are provided for the students at the academic, personal and psycho-social levels. The college also organizes programmes to sensitize the faculty and students on gender inclusion and environment.

The college maintains a student-centric and learner-centric atmosphere to achieve the desired learning outcomes. The teachers employ interactive and participatory approach creating a feeling of responsibility in learning and make learning a process of construction of knowledge. Interactive instructional techniques like focused group discussions, projects, brain storming sessions, Power Point Presentations and application of ICT resources enrich the teaching learning experience and engage students in higher order thinking and investigation. Creating e-modules, question banks, regular evaluation and assessment of questions and generation of material and content for summative exams are some of the best practices of the college. Eminent national scientists and academic luminaries enrich our faculty and students.

Head of the institution help faculty members to enhance their professional competency. A total of 10 faculties are Ph.D. 6 are registered out of 25 permanent faculties. As an institution with 26 years of service to the nation, the college has evolved an educational pattern with higher emphasis upon formative evaluation and is, therefore, conducive to the formation of higher level cognitive skills.

The College has the distinction of having on its staff outstanding scholars whose erudition has been recognized at International and National level and added a new dimension to the reputation of the college. Formal Awards have been given to our faculty members in recognition of their meritorious excellence in their respective fields. Faculty takes initiative to learn and keep abreast of the latest developments, to innovate continuously, seek improvement in their work and strive for individual and institutional excellence. The college organizes seminars, conferences, for further development of teaching, learning and evaluation processes. The college has software for assessing competitive exercises. A number of research papers have also been published.

3. Research, Consultancy and extension

The college encourages its staff to take up research activities and engage in interdisciplinary and interdepartmental research activities. Research ambience in the campus is achieved by the visits of experts and Scientists. The policy of the institution to promote campus to community research culture in the campus has led to a number of case studies and project. The college provides full support in terms of administrative, academic and human resources required to enable faculty to submit project proposals. Our faculty members have won some awards on state and national level for their quality research. The departments of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Commerce, English, etc. have collaborations with different universities and colleges for upgrading the research. Efforts are being made to get these departments recognized as Research Centers of the region.

First ever National Conference in the college on "Novel Synthesis of Advanced Materials and their Applications (NSAMA-2015)" Eminent national scientists, scholars, industrialists and social activists shared the dais to deliberate on these issues of momentous importance. Presence of researchers from whole country added national dimension to the research activity. Some faculty members always participate in national and international conferences for presentation of their different research papers. The college has potential to initiate research activities. Then maximum number of teachers are engaged in the publishing their research papers. To promote research based activities college organized national, state, university level conferences and seminars in different subjects. The faculty members are actively involved in the research. Two minor research projects in Zoology & Marathi are ongoing, 4 minor research projects are submitted to UGC, Physics Department submitted major research project to DST (SERB) and DRDO. Research guide in Physics has registered 3 Ph.D. students and the research is ongoing. 2 faculty members are applied to University for getting research guide recognition. The college faculty presenting and publishes their research contribution in the international, national, state level confereses, seminars, and workshop and in journals.



The College is doing appreciable extension through its NSS volunteers and also associating teachers closely in this area. Various awareness programmes like blood donation, AIDS Awareness, Literacy Drive, Tree Plantation, and collecting donations for helping affected families of sucide farmers, cancer patients etc., are commendable extension activities. The College conducted some workshops and seminars in collaboration with the University and local bodies. The college is actively involved in research and consultancy and expansion of outreach programs through NSS unit of the College.

4. Infrastructure and Learning Resource

The college has ICT enabled smart rooms, Computer lab, spacious class rooms, specialized labs like Chemistry lab and dark room are extensively used for effective teaching-learning and research. The institution maintains Botanical garden, vermin composting, educational museums of Zoology, career and counseling cell, women's common room, staff room and examination cell. The Library has adequate text and reference books, journals and periodicals, audio-video cassettes and internet facility. The Library is totally computerized with soul software. A printer is available in the library for the students to get printing of various references and other learning. There are 4511 text books and 108 reference books in the library. There is book bank facility and students can borrow 2/3 books for 5/7 days. The central computer facility is available in the library. Keeping in view the role and impact of technological advancements on higher education, the college has upgraded technology to give a new direction to teaching learning experience. The college is having connectivity of internet. The access of internet is provided to every department, administrative office, library through broadband network. The College is continually updating its automation facilities, which will soon be a complete database of all college information to facilitate retrieval and usage for administrative and academic purposes.

The college has a department of sports with health club, spacious playgrounds with adequate provision for storing sports equipments with Gymkhana. The college has 2 acres playground for sport activities, for cricket, volleyball, kabbadi, etc. The sports ground is well maintained and it is protected by a compound wall. All Departments have separate self-contained and spacious well equipped laboratories. A generator and inverters are available for continuous electric supply to computers, classrooms and other equipments. Keeping in mind the advancement of information technology, the college promotes the use of computers, internet and other technological facilities.

The college has a separate well-equipped Seminar hall with a public address system of high quality and with a capacity of 150 seats for its academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. LCD projector and a laptop are available for power point presentations by resource persons, teachers and students.

The College has common facilities like Vehicle Parking, Canteen, purified drinking water and Students Consumer Co-operative Store. College Library, laboratories, Office have back-up facilities with generators and inverters. In XII plan there is a provision of construction of auditorium, boys and girls hostels.



5. Student Support and progression

The diverse programmes in academics and co-academics as well as in sports, cultural and scientific activities are well synchronized and reinforced with an effective support system to produce enlightened and self-reliant students as visualized in the vision and mission of the college. The college has the requisite provisions which facilitate progression of students to higher level or towards gainful employment. College provides updated information to the students. 95% of the students appear in the final examination. Dropout rate is very less, 80% of the graduates either pursue higher education or join in services. College makes special efforts to encourage failed students to continue their education. College has Grievance box where students drop their grievances. Box is opened in a week and principal take necessary action. Any grievance, raging case found is scrutinized and necessary actions taken by the concerned authority.

College conducts Spoken English Classes to overcome the deficiency in language skills. The college has established the cell for career counseling, remedial coaching for weak students, and entry-level competitive examinations in various services. Excellent Student award has been instituted as a token of appreciation for the students with proven record of excellence throughout their campus life. Sports day, annual fete, and celebration of different national and international days with fervour ensure the participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular events. The SC/ST/VJ/NT/SBC/OBC and economically needy students are provided equal opportunities through scholarships from social welfare department.

Extracurricular activities, sports and games are well encouraged by the college and arrange tours of the students for their personality development. College organized a programme 'Meet the Principal' where in the students had opportunity to interact freely with the Principal for solving the problems in quality education system in terms of suggestions and discussion. Efforts are made to uplift them by organizing remedial classes. Special coaching for SC/ST/VJ/NT/OBC/economically needy students is organized. Events at the departmental level are designed to supplement quality teaching and personality development of students. The Sport department and faculty members encourage students to participate in university and state level curricular and co-curricular programmes. Expert professional trainers help in the development of leadership skills and life skills in the students. The college has a galaxy of alumni who have done the institution proud over the last two decade and they continue to have an indelible impact in the contemporary scenario. The college has a registered Alumni Association which has a dynamic relationship with the alumni. Their feedbacks are highly appreciated.

6. Governance, Leadership and management

The policy of management is to promote education. They meet periodically with the principal, teachers, non-teaching staff and students. There is a sound internal coordination and monitoring mechanism in the college. The work efficiency of the teaching and non-teaching staff is conducted through a good monitoring mechanism.



The management of the college is centralized and the Principal is the central administrative head. The teacher and non-teaching staff members have representation on the Local Management Committee. The annual budget is prepared and passed in LMC meetings. The accounts of receipts and expenses are maintained and audited regularly at the end of the financial year.

Regular meetings of MVS, LMC, and Heads of Departments offer a platform to present and discuss the perspective plans of the college and help in effective implementation of institutional policies. Ever since its inception, the college has been blessed with an array of dynamic Principal, who have enhanced the quality of college's educational services and led to phenomenal growth and development of the college. The Principal works closely with administrative team, Co-ordinators of different committees and Head of the Departments to offer effective leadership by setting values and participative decision-making process in co-ordinating the academic and administrative planning and implementation.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

Admission Process

The college has a transparent admission process. The admission process is offline and the norms for admission as per the rules of our affiliated University and Government of Maharashtra. Students are admitted according to reservation criteria. The merit list is displayed on notice board and ample time is given to get admission. The closing date of admission as per University guidelines is also displayed.

College Prospectus

At the beginning of academic year, the college prepares updated prospectus which provides detailed information about the college, admission process and eligibility criteria for admission, fee structure, documents necessary for the admission, courses offered and infrastructural facilities. It also enlists the subject structure and subject combinations for three years B. A., B.Com. and B.Sc. It also provides detailed information about academic as well as support facilities. The academic calendar, rules and regulations and meritorial prizes are also mentioned in the prospectus.

College Website

The college has developed website: <u>http//www.acsmaregaoncollege.co.in</u> and it is updated regularly for the convenience of students and parents. Complete details are placed on the website to facilitate online access to the requisite information about the college.

Advertisement in Regional Newspapers

The college regularly publishes advertisements about admissions in leading regional newspapers.

The merit of admission seekers is created on the basis of marks obtained by them in their XII Board Examination in accordance with the Reservation Norms of the GOM.

Admissions for UG Courses are given on merit basis. The students who fulfill the minimum criteria for admission as per university norms are admitted. Our mission being to provide the benefit of education to the lesser privileged and marginalized sections (SC/ST/OBC/VJ/NT/SBC), there is no cut off percentage for admission.

The College has a mechanism to review the admission process and student profile annually. Admission Process has been automated and the profile of the students admitted is obtained. Thus slow learners and advanced learners are identified. Student performance record in all the fields, academic, extracurricular and sports is maintained in the office.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students.

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

As per the Government norms, seats are reserved for differently abled students. The college implements schemes of Government of Maharashtra and U.G.C. for their benefit. The differently abled students are few in number. They provided facility as per their needs and demands.

Yes. The student is assessed at the time of admission on the basis of marks at entry level and communication skills. The subject teachers also assess the



knowledge and skills of the students through classroom interaction and discussion with them. Their strengths and deficiencies are identified. Accordingly teachers develop their strategies for improving their knowledge before the commencement of actual subject teaching.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.

The knowledge gaps of the student are identified after assessing them through class room interaction, discussion and academic performance during the previous years. College organized remedial coaching to overcome the knowledge gap of these students and special attention is given towards the students who need extra support to understand the subject.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college sensitizes the students and staff on the issues such as gender, inclusion, environment by organizing seminars, guest lectures and workshop. The college established Different cells women cell, human right cell, youth Development centre, Science Club, Student's Council, NSS which take up suitable activities for creating awareness among the students and staff.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

Teachers are identified advanced learners through interactive classroom teaching and discussions. The advanced learners are also identified on the basis of performance in class tests, term tests, internal and University examinations.

The institution adopts various strategies for facilitating advanced learners like seminars, group discussions, quiz competitions, etc. They are constantly encouraged and guided for preparation of various competitions. They also get opportunity to participate in several national events. Students are encouraged to communicate with their faculty at any time and discuss their problems. Various extension lectures are organized to overcome the learning needs of advanced learners. Teachers gives them Additional project work and necessary guidance to them in addition to extra reading materials. Concerned faculty members facilitate to these student.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

Admission Committee and Examination committee collect the data of academic performance of the students and data is analyzed. Remedial classes are organized for the slow learners and the students those are at the risk of drop out and improve their performance. Counseling of such students is done at departmental level to resolve related problems and is motivated to pursue academics in the college.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Academic Calendar: College prepared the Academic calendar before the commencement of the session within the frame of academic calendar circulated by the university. The calendar outlines the session, examination and holiday schedules. It also includes different academic activities, evaluation schedules and extracurricular activities.

Teaching Plan: All teaching faculty members prepared a teaching plan by distributing units and topics of the prescribed syllabus. It is clear and understandable and reflects what the faculty is planning to do for the current session course. Regular time-table is notified for the students and teachers. Each department prepares its own annual plan which includes activities such as invited lectures, ICT based programs, group activities, class seminars, project assignments.

Evaluation: Teacher conducts class test unit wise and the college conducts internal assessment test examination. The student's performance can also be evaluated through activities like, assignments, seminars, projects etc. The entire assessment process is as per university internal assessment scheme.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

Our College submits Self Study Report (SSR) to the National Assessment & Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore for Accreditation first time. Hence, IQAC is not established.

2.3.3 How learning is made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Learning is made more student-centric through group activities like group discussions, academic debates, model making, field work, quizzes, writing Competitions, debates and poetry. Almost all the departments in our college organize various types of coacademic and cultural events like quiz, poster-making, paper-reading, debates, skits, etc. that help to develop personality of students. The Inter-college and interdepartmental academic and extracurricular



programmes besides enhancing creativity bring a competitive edge to the academic endeavour of the students. For seminars, Computers, LCD-Projectors are available to the students. College arranges educational tours, excursions, visits to research centers and industrial units. The college has computer lab and Library with internet and Wi-Fi facility to develop interactive skills.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college has good infrastructure facility to the students and all the departments of science have well-equipped laboratories. Some departments have their own library. Books are provided to the students from departmental library. The Science Association encourages the students to prepare posters on scientific aspects and displayed on notice board.

Almost all the departments actively engage in arranging various types of coacademic and cultural events like quiz, paper-reading, debates, etc. that help the students in refining and redefining their personality.

In addition to this, the college takes special efforts among the learners by providing the opportunities like academic projects, seminars, power point presentations, creative assignments viz. story writing competition, slogan writing, essay writing competition, quiz, participating in academic activities at Regional level, organising academic activities at departmental and inerdepartmental level, panel discussions and group discussions, Study tours, industrial visits and field visits.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Every department is provided with computing facilities equipped with internet and Wi-Fi, most of the faculty members and students use these facilities and update their teaching material and research.

In addition to the lecture method teacher used teaching aids like:

- Power point presentations.
- Educational games in Chemistry and Physics.
- Seminars for students.
- Class room presentation and term tests.
- Group Discussions and Seminars for Students.
- Educational trips.
- Industrial visits.
- Extension lecture by experts.



2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The faculty and students are exposed to IT upgrade training programmes to keep them abreast of the latest developments. Faculty members and students participate in many academic programmes in campus and outside the campus so that they get ample exposure to the modern technology, advanced teaching methods and related skills.

The internet is primarily used by the faculty as well as students for up gradation of knowledge. In addition to this, the recent trends in all subjects are available in journals, magazines, periodicals, and newspapers, which are readily available in the central library of the College. The college has subscribed for INFLIB-NET N- list, through which sufficient e-books and e-journals are made available to the faculty members and students.

The guest lectures and seminars are organized on the current issues, so as to develop insights into the current issues. It helps the students and teachers to keep pace with the recent developments in various subjects. Besides this, the teachers are motivated to attend seminars, conferences, workshops and also deputed to attend orientation and refresher programmes.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advises) provided to students?

Professional Counselling Services: Student Counselling Centre attends to the psychosocial needs of students. Career guidance programmes are arranged for the students to help them plan their future and job opportunities. The College established a Guidance Centre of UPSC, MPSC, Civil Services, etc for students.

Mentoring: Each teacher in our college takes keen interest to mentor students. Teacher-student mentoring is a regular feature but we also promote student-student mentoring. Members of student union take the initiative to mentor fresh students. The teachers also play a role of guardians of students. They guide the students on personal level. It establishes rapport among the students and teachers.

Academic advice: Teachers meet the students regularly and provide personalized academic support and guidance. Occasionally the students receive academic advice at the time of inaugural functions of the various committees. The dignitaries having academic aptitude, the authorities from the universities and educationalists from the region are invited to extend academic advice to our students. The students are informed about advanced courses, like PG courses in different subjects. They are also informed about web-site of higher



educational institutes such as ICAR, NCL, TIFR, BARC, etc. Alumni on higher post are invited for academic advice.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college has been trying to make corresponding changes in the use of new technologies and methods for teaching, learning and governance. The faculty members of the institution use computers, LCD projectors and internet. They are fledged with other supporting tools like printers, scanners. College also provides facilities in library such as, books, journal, teaching aids, ICT etc. It helps in enhancing the self learning abilities and knowledge level of the students. The institution is very keen regarding use of these modern teaching aids. The Principal verify time to time, the use of ICT by the faculty member and give proper suggestions. Students are highly benefitted by these innovative teaching methods.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has a general library. It provides, text books, reference books, journals, magazines and question papers of previous university examinations, research papers, other reading materials, internet, etc. In addition there are some departmental libraries for faculty members and students.

Automation Software (INFLIB-NET) is installed in the library. The students can easily locate the books on the basis of author, subject and title. Every enrolled student is the member of library. The students are allowed to borrow the books twice in a week. A time table of issue of books is displayed in the library. Each student is allowed to borrow two books at a time. The library has a reading room with seating capacity of 25 students.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If "yes", elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes. The college faces many challenges in completing the curriculum within the timeframe like semester pattern of university examination, practical and internal examination schedules, late declaration of results and unexpected loss of working days.

Measures adopted to overcome these challenges: Challenges mentioned above can be overcome by arranging extra classes and commencement of courses irrespective of results.



2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Class checking committee of college developed a systematic mechanism to ensure and enhance the quality of teaching and learning. Committee received feedback from the students, parents, alumni and stakeholders and extent it to make more relevant and effective. Class teachers get feedbacks on their teaching from students and try to incorporate it. If feedback or complaint directly reaches to the HOD, it is promptly analyzed by the concerned authority and if needed the concerned teachers is appropriately counseled to improve academic standards.

Teachers attend refresher and orientation courses to upgrade their teaching skills and refresh their knowledge in the field. Performance of students can be assested by conducting class tests, term tests and identify slow learners and take necessary steps like special classes and extra coaching for such students to improve their studies. The quality of teaching and learning is also assessed on the basis of the results of the subjects. At the end of every semester, the results of each subject and every paper are scrutinized and if the results are not satisfactory, it is communicated to the teacher and asked to improve the results next time. All the class rooms are under the watch of CCTV Cameras. The Principal and senior most teachers always observe the footage of teaching learning process in the class rooms.

2.4 Teacher Quality

All faculty members are filled up as per the norms laid down by UGC and GOM. The college has the required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses of all departments. For exrta work, temporary teachers are employed. The policy of recruitment is transparent. During recruitment of staff, the College advertises the vacancies of posts in some regional and some state level newspapers. Norms regarding eligibility and reservation are strictly followed.

Faculty membrs of our college are motivated to the students to undertake the exams and detailed feed-back is provided to them for further improvement. Complete transparency is maintained in the internal assessment. The internal assessment is done as per the guidelines of the university. After preparing the assessment report, it is submitted by the subject teacher to the Examination and internal assessment committee of the College.

Yes, the institution and individual teachers use assessment as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. Faculty members of our college arranged seminars of the students on the various important topics of the subject evaluated through grading. Assignments are given to the students and are checked by the teacher. The record of these evaluations is maintained by the respective teacher. Term tests are conducted at the end of each term to assess the progress of the student and highlight the scope for further improvement.

During class teaching, there is face-to-face communication between teachers and students. In science faculty, all the subjects have practical paper. During practical also, there is face-to-face communication, during which performance, behavior and overall subject knowledge of the students are observed by the teachers. These characteristics are considered for evaluation during practical examinations. The NSS and Sports students are also given due advantages in assessment.

Complete transparency is maintained in the evaluation process. Evaluated answer books are given back to students with detailed feedback for their improvement and clarification. If there is any, grievance relating to university examination, it is redressed by the examination committee and internal assessment committee of the college if it is possible at college level. The doubts of students about evaluation are cleared by the concerned teachers. So, there are no any grievances of students with reference to evaluation at the College level. During the period of internal examination, the students are deputed to attend NSS and Sports activities separate internal examination is conducted for such students.

Minor research project conducted by the Department of Zoology entitled "Phylogeography of human lymphatic filarial parasite, Wuchereria bancrofti in Vidarbha region" will definitely help the community in various ways. The study is first attempt from India till date and it will help to generate molecular information related phylogenetic and phylogeography of filarial parasite. The study will not only help to document the diversity of filarial parasite but will also provide insight into mode of multiple organ infections. Taking into account the facility and expertise available with PI, the successful implementation of proposed project will help to investigate the species specific pattern of filarial parasite species. Moreover, considerable decrease in the cost of DNA related consumables and services worldwide will help to achieve the objectives.

Research work carried out by the Department of physics entitled "Synthesis of ferrofluids, study of its thermal conductivity and some investigation in industrial applications" will definitely help the community in various ways. In coming decade proposed study will become a major theme for the material scientist in India. Synthesis of ferrofluids, thermal conductivity and its thermoacoustic characterization is not yet easily available in India. This research will be useful to researchers in India in the field of characterization of novel nanofluid materials. The applications of ferrofluids materials will be a significant development and will require expertise from defense, life sciences, medical sciences, industrial research, aircraft, etc.

Due to the restriction of space, energy, and weight in space station and aircraft, there is a strong demand for high efficient cooling system with smaller size. The order of magnitude increases in the critical heat flux in pool boiling with ferrofluids compared to the base fluid alone. Further research of ferrofluids will lead to the development of next generation of cooling devices that incorporate ferrofluids for ultrahigh-heat-flux electronic systems, presenting the possibility of raising chip power in electronic components or simplifying cooling requirements for space applications. A number of military devices and systems require high-heat flux cooling to the level of tens of MW/m^2 . At this level, the cooling of military devices and system is vital for the reliable operation. Ferrofluids with high critical heat fluxes have the potential to provide the required cooling in such applications as well as in

other military systems, including military vehicles, submarines, and highpower laser diodes. Therefore, ferrofluids have wide application in space and defense fields, where power density is very high and the components should be smaller and weight less. Proposed study help to reduce the size of plane by one third on the basis of thermal conductivity study of ferrofluids.

Research inputs contributing to new initiatives and social development:

The research output of our institute such as Phylogeography of human lymphatic filarial parasite, Wuchereria bancrofti in Vidarbha region and Synthesis of ferrofluids, study of its thermal conductivity and some investigation in industrial applications will contribute to the social development in the near future.

NSS: College has NSS unit with necessary facilities. Students are actively participating in NSS camp.

The top management of institution provides autonomy to the principal and the principal provides autonomy to all head of the departments and the faculty members for teaching methodologies and innovative practices for improvement in quality education. All the head of the departments discuss the problems related to college development, Curriculum design and implementation, UGC-innovative programmes, administration, infrastructural needs and student disciplines. The role and responsibilities of the staff are communicated to the staff. Staff meetings are held regularly in the chairmanship of the president of the institute.

The management of institution is liberal and democratic in practice. The faculty members and non-teaching staffs are the members of building committee, discipline committee, examination committee, admission committee, sports committee etc. All committees are constituted with a mix of senior and junior members and middle level faculty members convener of some important committees. Total functional freedom is given to the convenors of all committees, to bring out the leadership qualities among the faculty members. Students are grooming their leadership through student council and various associations. Students prove their leadership qualities by organizing various academic activities and events.

The principal with the support of heads of the departments and various committees creates educational environment in the college campus. Administrative powers and responsibilities are delegated to faculty members on the basis of their competence and commitment. The faculty members create positive and motivating environment in the campus.

Human resource management:



The college accepts the feedback from faculty members for the adequate human power requirements. Best Practice – I

Botanical Garden

Introduction

Botanical garden plays a fundamental role in field of plant conservation by motivating student and creating interest in nature and its protection. The aim of establishment of botanical garden is to promote the environmental education and student awareness about plant diversity, threaten and endemic flora of the region.

In a botanical garden repository of germplasm collection for having wide genetic base with special reference to the representative of plant species such as ornamental plants, economically importance plants, medicinal plant and educative plant species.

Goal

- \checkmark To inspire and create awareness among students about the importance of plants conservation and protection.
- ✓ Ex-situ conservation of rare, endangered, endemic and important medicinal plant.

Objective

To achieve the goal of establishment of botanical garden there are following mile stones:

The objective of establishing botanical garden is carried out the research on all aspect of the plants, such as ornamental plants, xerophytes plants and hydrophytes.

Also the garden established to provide the information regarding to regional herbal medicinal plant and to generate interest among the students.

The agenda of garden is to promote the awareness and information of herbal medicine to farmers and tribal and rural communities residing in Maregaon region. Because Maregaon has tribal population which still relies on herbal medicine due to the geographic, socioeconomic and culture reason.

The context

The whole area of botanical garden is 120 x 70 Sq.feet. The garden is architect by the expert Prof. Ravi Matte of L. T. College, Wani and by Mr. Rajendra Kale of Shri Shail Herbs Nursery, Nagpur.

The practice

Department of Botany maintains botanical garden with plantation of ornamental and local medicinal plants. Many tree species are planted time to time in specific occasion in botanical garden as well as college campus. For maintains of the garden regular eradication of weeds and exotic plant species is carried out. The vermicomposting is self-processed by Department of Zoology which is used for healthy growth and development of plants.



Uniqueness

In the botanical garden we planted medicinal plants like – Andrographis paniculata (Burm.f.) Nees, Aloe vera (L), Burm.f., Vinca rosea L., Ocimum sanctum L., Chlorophytum spp., Mimosa pudica L, Amorphophallus spp., Adathoda vasica Mathew, Cissus quadrangularis L., Abrus precatorius L., Tinospora cordifolia (Wild.) Hook f. & Thomson, Dioscorea bulbifera L., Butea monosperma (Lam.) Taub, Albizia lebecck (L.) Bth, Sapindus emarginatus Vahl, Azadirachta indica A. Juss, Buchanania lanzan (Laur), Almeida, Tectona grandis L.f.. We also planted ornamental plants such as Rosa spp., Thunbergia spp. Hibiscus rosa-sinensis L., Duranta erecta L., Nerium indicum Mill, Taebermontana spp., Jasminum officinalis L., and Almenda spp. In addition to these plants we also planted some members of Gymnosprerm like Cycus spp., Thuja occidentalis, Aurocaria spp.We have constructed one water tank for hydrophytic plant like Hydrilla spp. which is used for the experimental purposes in practical schedule.

Constraints

- There is no permanent employer as a Gardner, so very tragedy for handling the whole garden area, as well as to maintain and protect the garden plants species.
- Lack of resources.
- The area of botanical garden is not sufficient for the model botanical garden so there is a limitation for the plantation of more plant species.

Evidences of success

The college has botanical gardens with various types of medicinal plants and ornamental plants which are successfully fulfill the purpose of biodiversity conservation and campus beautification. We use Botanical Garden as a learning resource centre with live examples, where we conduct specific programme for the awareness and boosting interest of student in nature and environment such as:

- \checkmark Study of plant adaptation
- ✓ Study of medicinal plant and their therapeutic values
- \checkmark Study of common plant and their uses
- ✓ Studies of common trees

Botanical garden use as the biggest outdoor class room, which is an exploratory centre to facilitate the free flow of quantitative and qualitative information which is given in theoretical syllabus such as the plant ecological experiment viz. Density, abundance, frequency of plant species.

Botanical garden includes ex-situ maintenance of economically important plant species ornamental plants and medicinally important rare and endangered plant species.

Problems encountered and resources required

There is no permanent employer as a Gardner, so very difficult for handling the whole garden area, also to maintain and protect the garden plant species. The work was done by the daily wages persons. The termite is a major problem for growth of the further plants. The scarcity of the water during the summer season also one of the major problem.

- The ultimate goal of programme is to educate and inspire students about the practical benefits and environmental value of vermicomposting. So, that they and their peers continue to compost throughout their future lives. In addition to that, we hope to expand the programme in future so that as much organic waste as possible can be diverted from the landfill to the compositers and be processed in environmentally sustainable ways.

Context

Forest officer Mr. Salim Khan provided the Worm Compost as well as the knowledge to construct plant and how to obtain the successful production. Useful information was obtained through Internet, Wikipedia.

Practice

Vermi-culture is the science of vermi-composting. Verms can eat their body weight each day in fruit and vegetable scraps, leaving casting as the byproduct. Worm casting are called worm compost.

• Clean up and preparation of Vermibeds

Our department started the vermiculture plan on December 10, 2014 with the clean up and preparation of vermiculture bed on previously built cement tank located at the botanical garden of Arts Commerce and Science College, Maregaon campus. We have cleaned vermin beds and started to gather substrates.

• Substrate application

We put a mixture of loam soil, cowdung and partially decomposed leaves in the vermin bed. Before putting the substrates, we made sure that the materials are cut or break into smaller pieces. Finer particle could easily decompose. We also mixed the different media together well for the worms to easily digest there. We have moistened the materials and cover the initiate anaerobic decomposition. The substrates were kept in the beds for 10 days before we put the vermin worms. It took 10-15 days to complete anaerobic decomposition and only then that they are ready for worm consumption.

• Introducing the vermi-worms Red wriggler

After 10 days upon putting the substrates into the vermin beds, we introduce the vermi worms into the substrate on December 26. We used the Red wriggler in our vermin compost. We moistened the substrate regularly to provide the right moisture (60-80%) for the vermin worms to grow and multiply.

Uniqueness

- ✓ This is the first Worm Compost plant started ever in Maregaon and Wani Tehsil.
- ✓ The product (Worm compost) was distributed to poor and needy farmers of Maregaon free of cost.

Constraints

- ✓ Vermiculture is a substantial way of reducing wastes, producing fertilizers & maintaining the balance of the ecological environment.
- ✓ Vermicomposting can produce high- quality fertilizers which are better compared to other commercial fertilizers in the market.
- ✓ Vermiculture converts farm wastes into organic fertilizer making it an environment-friendly technology.

Evidence of Success

Harvesting will commence 10-14 days or 2 weeks after stocking of worms. Prior to harvest, we refrained from watering the substrate for the last 3 days to ease the separation of castings from worms and likewise preventing the casting to become compact. On Jan 16, we had the first harvest of the vermicast or the worm manure and utilized by botany department for garden.

Problems Encountered and Resources required

There were few problems that were easily solved by the resourcefulness of the zoology department. The growth of mold repored in the vermin-compost, but it was attributed to the food not being buried properly and was easily corrected by us. Due to open place dried out the first level of vermin-compost, which caused newspaper between the layers to degrade. Subsequently, the first layer caved in on the second layer. The first level however was quickly reconstructed.

Availability of raw material: worm compost is obtained from Amravati Forest department near wadali, which is very long distance to travel from Maregaon (200 Km).

Nocturnal worm feeder like frogs and sink destructs the population of worms by consuming them on large scale.
